Hi everyone,

You may recall that several months ago that the island schools won a silver National Education Award as finalists for 'impact through partnership' – we were one of only four groups in Britain to get this. Well, this weekend, Mrs MacLachlan (the Head Teacher of the six other island primaries) and I are travelling down to London for the final award ceremony where we will discover, Oscars style, if we are the Gold winners. Some of the winners have been surprised this week on the One Show; our category will be revealed on the night. I have said it many times, and I will say it again – it is our schools' relationship with our communities that shapes and drives the quality of the experiences for our young people. I know that as Head Teachers, we are both very grateful to you and if we win, this award will belong to everyone.

This week, our North Ayrshire Senior manager, Laura Cook, was in school as part of a quality improvement visit. It was a pity that Covid restrictions meant that some of the observations could not take place but she did manage to speak to teaching staff and small groups of pupils in both Early Years and Primary. I am pleased to say that the visit went very well; it was clear that a lot of work has been put into ensuring that our environment is stimulating and positive and as usual, the pupils were articulate and informative. The manager was satisfied that we were endeavoring to ensure the best possible outcomes for our learners in raising attainment and achievement, despite very challenging circumstances. Ms Cook also met with staff to hear how we taking forward initiatives to ensure wellbeing, equality and inclusion. I would like to thank both staff and pupils for making this a very positive and beneficial experience. It is lovely to have their efforts affirmed by a visitor to the school.

Swimming lessons have started! In the coming weeks and months all of our pupils will receive a block of lessons at the Auchrannie pool. Once again, I'd like to give a huge thank you to the Parent Council - without their support this would just not be possible and I think that the ability to swim and confidence in water is essential for children living on an island near the sea.

EARLY YEARS CLASS NEWS

Autumn is one of our favourite seasons in the EYC and we can't quite believe that winter is just around the corner! There is an exciting buzz in the air as we gradually see lots more sparkles, glitter and festive colours appearing in the early years class.

What exciting things have we been learning in the last few weeks?

Welly Wednesday's - the children absolutely thrive during our outdoor excursions to the woodland area. The changing seasons allow the children to identify and experience how nature and the weather can change from month to month. They have been particularly busy exploring the different colours and contrasting textures of the fallen leaves that lay on the woodland floor. One of our favourite activities is to make those wonderful crunch, crunch, crunch noises when walking on the crispy leaves! Another exciting element this week has been the opening of our very own nursery café, the 'Good Food Café'!



The children have been focusing on numeracy and mathematics and the implementation of a till and money has encouraged counting, problem solving and social interaction. The children have been

taking food and drinks orders from each other and writing these down on pads, thus developing their language and literacy skills as well as communication skills. The practitioners have thoroughly enjoyed visiting the café and tasting the delicious healthy foods that the children cook in the café kitchen, yum yum!



We have recently introduced our Early Years Class Superheroes which we are all SUPER excited about!

Where did they come from? They came from the planets Aims and Values (our school aims and values are Compassion, Belonging, Ambition and Trust).

What do they help us with? They help us to understand what trust means to us, where and how we belong, how and why compassion is important and give us the strength and motivation to climb ambition mountain and enjoy the sense of achievement that it brings to us. *Why have they come to live with us?* To embed their superpower values into the lives of our little people. 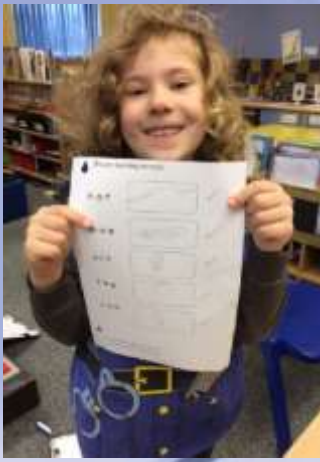


P1/2 NEWS

We've been exploring colour during our art sessions. We looked at the 3 primary colours and used them to make a fantastic piece of collaborative artwork. We then looked at how these primary colours can be mixed in order to create the secondary colours. We were inspired by the artist Kandinsky to mix the primary colours together in order to create secondary colour circles. In Literacy, we've been working on instructional writing. We've really enjoyed this because we were able to be really bossy! This is because we were learning about imperative verbs, bossy verbs, and how we need to use them at the beginning of our instructional sentences. Instructional writing has also been a hit because we gave verbal instructions in order to make some toast! I think everyone's favourite instruction was: Eat the toast!

Reading and phonics skills are ever developing here in P1/2 and it is fantastic to see the children applying their new knowledge of letter sounds and digraphs in order to read and write words.





We've explored pattern in maths; enjoying our time outside on Outdoor Learning Day, to complete our patterns out in the fresh air using lots of natural objects. We also used our RME sessions exploring the Hindu festival of Diwali to look at Rangoli patterns, investigating the symmetry in these.



We've now begun estimating and rounding, which is proving a challenging topic and something new for our triangles and squares, in particular, to sink their teeth in to!

With Mrs MacHale the children have been focusing on addition (and subtraction for some!), discussing different ways of doing a calculation to get the correct answer. Children need to be exposed to lots of different ways of thinking and calculating to find out what works best for them. Number talks are a way to increase mental agility and discuss a maths problem as a group. It even has a special hand-language to join in!





Mrs MacHale's outdoor learning sessions have had a nature theme this term. Activities ranged from a ghoulish Halloween skull challenge; to sitting very quietly waiting to spot a rare bird or fine-tuning our fine-motor skills while helping birds survive the winter, making bird feeders. Outdoor games have been teaching us about how squirrels disperse oak tree seeds (ask your child about 'Hide Your Nuts' game) and how bats find their food while playing the blindfold game – Bat Moth!



As ever Discovery Time is a great opportunity for the children to apply the skills they are learning and to take their own learning on a journey of their choice. Well done P1/2. We love to see you becoming independent learners. It's amazing to see how much learning we can experience and extend through simple 'play'!



We've enjoyed creating poppies for Remembrance day, taking our learning outside for Outdoor Classroom Day, exploring our Bookbug and Read, Write, Count books during Book Week Scotland, and raising money for Children in Need!
It's certainly been a busy month!



P3/4 NEWS

P3/4 have had another busy month. In Literacy and English, we have been focusing on punctuation; when to use capital letters and remembering to use a full stop, question mark or exclamation mark at the end of our sentences. We've continued to try and get outside to work on our spellings, as we enjoyed this so much on Outdoor Classroom Day.



In Numeracy and Mathematics, we have moved on from learning about shape, then pattern, to expanding our skills in addition and subtraction.

We enjoyed creating patterns, using pegboards.



In P.E., we are making great progress with our Badminton skills:



We created Bonfire art, using pastels on black paper.

In RME, we have been learning about Diwali, the festival of light. As part of this, we created salt dough diva lamps.





P4/5 NEWS



P4/5 have been doing lots of hands-on activities the past few weeks. We have been looking at chemical reactions and how yeast reacts with different ingredients to inflate a balloon. The class became master bakers with their bread making, delicious. We still have to launch a rocket using coke and Mentos to conclude this part of our topic work.

We have also grown a 'sloth' in class, he grew over 72 hours in a jar of water and when we took him out, he was huge. He has now slimmed down again as he dried out; our



new classroom pet.

We have been working hard on our times tables at home and in class, with some practical work outside with sticks and in class with Lego and counters. In Numeracy, we are also working on division and multiplication linking this to practical life. We have now moved onto time and are looking at the analogical clock and reading travel timetables.

In Literacy, the cuddly corner dogs were out of action until pupils wrote a persuasive letter to get them back. I can happily say they have been reinstated and are back for pupils to read in comfort. On the subject of reading, we buddied up with the P3/4 class and spent time reading to each other as part of reading week. This week is read-a-thon so we are counting the minutes read in class and at home with pupils being sponsored. Carry on reading.

Other news, in PE we are doing gymnastics, swimming and dance, and in topic we are finishing off our ocean eco system work. The window display of the eco system will be changing at the end of the week to show how excited we all are about Christmas and lots of practise is going into the school Christmas play.



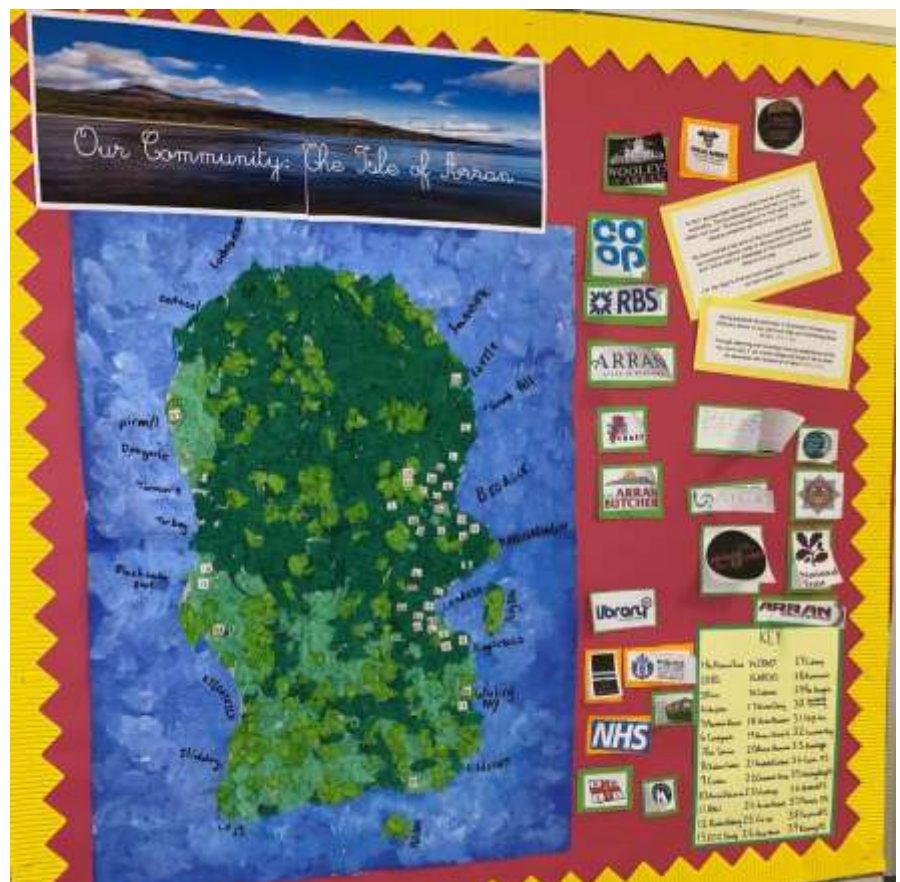


P6/7 NEWS

We also created some beautiful 'Through our eyes' art which helped us encapsulate our understanding of global warming.



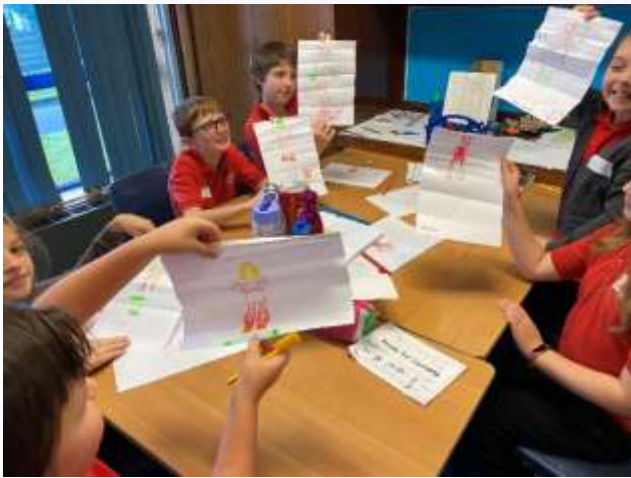

We have begun our learning about persuasive writing and have enjoyed exploring various persuasive devices such as alliteration, emotive language and rhetorical questions. We are focusing on structuring our persuasive writing to ensure we have clear, separate arguments. Some super work so far!

We had children in need last week and the P7s did a fantastic job of organising and running the team activities! A massive well done to them for all their efforts.

This week we enjoyed our first Gaelic Arts lesson. We listened to fairytale stories, shared our own and then did some hot-seating drama themed activities. It was lots of fun and we are looking forward to more activities with our specialists over the next few months.

An update from Mrs Henderson

As you know I am working as part of the North Ayrshire Council STEM team - part of our responsibility is Learning for Sustainability. Following COP26 we are looking to continue Learning for Sustainability in the form of recognising where the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (UNSDG's) fit in our everyday lives and our learning. All of us can do simple things to change our behaviour and help the planet. For example if every man, woman and child in Scotland (5.454 million people) switched off their lights for 10 minutes that would add up to 104 years of light saved. Your child may come home talking about some of these simple things we can do. Food waste is another area where we can all help the planet - if all the food waste in the world was added together it would emit the same CO2 of the 3rd most polluting country in the world. Faculty of Support

The Faculty of Support lies within the heart of the school community, providing guidance to all pupils and teaching staff alike to reduce barriers to learning. In the faculty, our goal is to work closely with pupils and school staff to support pupil's individual needs enabling them to flourish academically throughout their time on Campus at Arran High School, Lamblash Primary and Early Years Class.

The faculty is overseen by one the campus senior leadership team, Siobhan Wilks, Depute Head Teacher and jointly led by Jane Macbeth, Principal Teacher of Pastoral Support and Karen Officer, Principal Teacher of Additional Support Needs. The department team includes two teachers of Pupil Support, one teacher responsible for Developing the Young Workforce, a Nurture Teacher and Nurture Assistant and six classroom assistants. The team of experienced teachers, who have taught in a variety of subject areas, offer expertise and guidance to students and fellow colleagues alike; the team of skilled classroom assistants work with and support the pupils on a period to period basis. A wide range of emotional and social needs can be addressed by the team in addition to specific learning difficulties. The faculty team is complimented by a School Councillor, an Inclusion Worker and specialist colleagues including the School Nurse, Health Visitor, Educational Psychologist and Social Workers. In addition, our Wellbeing Centre team includes an Art Therapist, Family Counselling, Outdoor Learning and Speech and Language Consultancy. The department liaises with all faculties and in Primary and Nursery offering direction, advice, observational assessment, support and assessment as required. Over the coming months we will provide an insight into the team, their work and faculty priorities for the year.
